

Early intervention& Early Education

Goal:

Identify and enhance the normal development of the infants and toddlers at risk of developmental delays: Such as physical, cognitive, communication, social or emotional development, sensory and adaptive development.


Objectives

Early Identification

Children from 0-6 years show confidence and enjoy their right to education

- Families understand their own strengths, abilities and special needs and support their children to develop and learn.
- Ensure that the children with development delays receive support services
- Sensitization of other stakeholders on early identification & intervention among children with disabilities.
- Government departments at Taluk level and district level extend their support for the effective implementation of EI & EE programme

Early Intervention and early education programme involves identifying/screening children with different disabilities in the age group of 0-6 years, providing necessary intervention after proper assessment. Empowering parents to enable them to deal with the special needs of their disabled child and creating awareness amongst various stakeholders for ensuring the functional, developmental and coping abilities of children.







Smart Goal: To strengthen the ecosystem for early stage intervention and early education (EI & EE) for 450 children with disabilities/development delays of Kalaburagi Taluk and 3 PHC Hoonkirangi, Farhatabad, Savalgi between the age group of 0-6 years and the relevant stakeholders through therapeutic and support services.

Objective of Early Intervention: To identify disability in minimum 450 children between 0 - 6 year old, assist them with identification of disability trehabilitate them in order to mitigate the effects of disability to as they grow.

Objectives:

- 1. Identification of 315 children with disabilities
- To provide assistance in surgeries, medicine, physiotherapy and speech and hearing therapy.
- 3. To Provide Assistive devices (Aids and Appliances)
- To reduce the impact of disability and to live independently.
- 5. To bring changes in Child and the attitude of the Parents
- 6. To provide education by fostering inclusive education
- 7. To facilitate Govt. entitlements

To create awareness among parents, students and people about the causes of Disability, Rights and entitlements of Disabled persons.

Focus: The focus of the project is to provide early intervention to the young children with developmental delay and other disabilities. Besides this, speech therapy, physical therapy, corrective surgeries, Occupational Therapy, psychological and audiology services would be provided as an integral part of this programme. Basic education and various coping strategies will be imparted to the children from 3-6 years in order to enrol them to the mainstream schools and get adjusted to the school environment.




Besides this, families especially the parents and care givers are helped to gain control over their lives and develop their capacity to meet the emerging needs of their children and to promote development. All the other stakeholders in the community will be made aware of the needs of such children and the necessary links to be utilized in providing service to these children and their families.

The success story of Uliay Kulsum:



Kulsuma, a girl child born on 22nd November 2012, is the eldest of two children of Mr. Usaman and Mrs. Reashma Bahanu, a poor couple from Tarfele Nagar, Kalaburgi. From birth, Kulsuma faced challenges with her mobility and was unable to sit or move on her own—she could only lie down.







At the age of four, the family was visited by Seva Sangama's Early Intervention and Education (EI & EE) animator, who brought hope to the parents. They reassured Mr. Usaman and Mrs. Reashma that with proper therapy, their daughter could improve her mobility.

With the support and therapy provided by Seva Sangama, Kulsuma's condition gradually improved. She is now able to sit, stand, and walk with the help of standing and sitting aids provided by the organization. Her parents are actively involved in her home-based therapy, training alongside the EI & EE team to continue Kulsuma's progress at home.

Thanks to the dedication of the SSDS staff and the unwavering support of her parents, Kulsuma's condition is steadily improving. Her parents have expressed heartfelt gratitude to the SSDS staff, whose interventions have brought remarkable results in their child's development.

UJJIVANA PROJECT PHASE III

Goal: Fostering and Securing Self-Sustaining Climate Resilient Agriculture. Livelihood

through Community-Owned Processes in Kalaburagi. The Ujjivana Project Phase III, implemented by SevaSangama with financial support from Misereor, Germany, has been underway since January 2026 in 10 villages of Gulbarga Taluk. The project aims to empower small landholding farmers (up to 5 acres) and encourage them to adopt modern and climate-resilient agricultural practices. It also provides technical support to help eligible small farmers access various government agro-based schemes and benefits.

During the current project period (January 2022 to December 2024), the initiative has successfully



mobilized several government agricultural schemes for small-scale farmers as follows:

Achievements through meetings/awareness and training programs:

- the agriculture department helped 9 SHGs through Suttu Nidi. Each SHGs were received Rs. 5000. Total Amount received Rs. 45000.
- 5 new farmers' groups were formed with a total 55 farmers
- 8 New SHGs were formed with 120 members.
 Farmers' groups came to know about Village level Banks, Schemes, and other facilities and they applied for loans for lower interest
- 8 New SHG's bank passbook opened.
- Celebrated district-level International Women's Day in Gulbarga. 175 women from the working area

participated. 4 achievers of women in different fields were honored during the program.

- Panchayati premises were cleaned and 1 drinking water plant was installed. As a result, people are getting clean water. (One water plant cost Rs 4,00,000).
- Mahananda, a member of the SHGs association, got a roti-making machine through a subsidy of Rs 70,000.
- 740 Members from 10 villages got information about Gram Panchayati facilities and Schemes
- 740members have received the benefits, of 48 Days of work. 316 per day. Total Rs. 1, 12, 24,320.
- Two training programs on animal husbandry were conducted for 83 participants. As a result, 18 members started animal husbandry activities. Through the sale of milk and curd, they currently earn Rs. 6,000 per month, totaling Rs. 72,000 per year. The collective annual income amounts to Rs. 12,96,000.
- Four linkage meetings were held with government departments: one with the agriculture department and two with Gram Panchayats. A total of 82 participants attended. As a result, 36 farmers applied for agricultural department schemes, and one farmer received a power tiller machine at a subsidized cost of 93,000 rupees.
- Two training sessions were organized on the Pradhan Mantri Ujjwala Yojana, with 132 families participating. Out of these, 82 families applied for the scheme, and 17 families received a free gas connection under the Pradhan Mantri Ujjwala Yojana. One unit cost Rs.6, 000. Total benefits 1,02,000 rupees.
- In five meetings, SHG members received off-farm training on various schemes. Of these, 17 members were trained in goat farming, 21 in poultry (chick) farming, and 12 in cow farming, benefiting a total of 50 farmers. Their monthly income is Rs. 7,000, amounting to Rs. 84,000 annually.







- Livelihood applications under SC/ST social welfare department schemes were submitted by 16 families.
- Under the PM Kisan Samman Nidhi scheme (eKYC link), Aadhaar cards of 211 farmers were linked.
- Millet survey completed, covering 360 households
- New registration for 87 Farmer Identification Cards (FID) was completed.
- Since the government has declared our working area as a drought-hit area, the Farmer Information Center organized a survey for crop compensation in

Fartahbad, Nandur K, and Dharmapur villages of Gulbarga District. A total of 186 farmers' lands were surveyed.

 Eight skill development training sessions were organized for low-income groups, with 142 members participating. They received awareness training in tailoring, embroidery,

and sambhar masala making. As a result, 36 of them have started selling cloth and offering embroidery services, earning Rs. 650 per day, which totals a monthly income of Rs. 19,500.

- Five meetings were conducted on government schemes for sustainable livelihood, with 95 members participating. Out of these, 44 members adopted diversified agriculture based on their needs and the changing climate..
- Six programs were conducted, and 130 members learned how to identify communityrelated issues through cross-learning.



• Forty-five beneficiaries received information on kitchen gardening, and among them, 18 are cultivating vegetables in their own surroundings

 Project implementers and community educators conducted awareness sessions on the Karnataka state government's five guarantee schemes. A total of 320 Grahalakshmi applications were submitted, and 140 members qualified for a monthly subsidy of Rs. 2,000. Additionally, 180 families applied for the Grah Jyothi scheme, which provides 200 units of free electricity.

Volunteer Somshekar assisted two farmers in obtaining Krishi Honda from the Gram Panchayat. The cost per unit is Rs. 55,000, bringing the total cost to Rs. 1,10,000, benefiting the farmers(dip 10 fit 4x4 width 25 fit)



- Volunteer Shajan Begma, under the Rohini company, distributed 160 saplings free of cost, including Mango (40), Pear (30), Drumstick (30), Sapodilla (30), and Lemon (30).)
- Eleven farmers were introduced to Vermi-Compost. Each unit costs 12,000, with a total cost of 1,32,000/-



A total of 18 beneficiaries received sheets of tarpaulin (Rasi Tadapatri) at a per-unit cost of 1,500, totaling 27,000.

Success story

Name: Parvati

· Occupation: Farmer

· Background: Mrs. Parvati

lived in Nandikur village with her husband and four children. They owned 5 acres of land but lacked irrigation pipes for farming. Introduction: Under the Ujjivan III program implemented by Seva Sangam Organization, community educators and coordinator visited Nandikur village and met Anjum. They gathered her complete information and found that she didn't have pipes for

mixed crop and vegetable farming on her 5 acres of land. She managed her farming using alternative methods to sustain her livelihood.

The community educator from Seva Guidance: Sangam Organization provided information and advised Parvati to apply for pipes at the Farmer Service Center. They suggested applying for a subsidy to obtain 30 pipes.

- Change: Mrs. Parvati took the guidance from the coordinators of the Ujjivan program and applied for pipes at the farmer service center. She received the pipes and started irrigation farming. They installed pipes and began irrigation farming on their land. She mentioned that the pipes were very helpful for growing vegetables and sustaining her farm.
- · Opinion: Parvati expressed gratitude to the community educators of Seva Sangam Organization for providing information, applying for pipes at the farmer service center, and obtaining 30 pipes on subsidy. She thanked the directors, assistant directors, coordinators, and workers of the Seva Sangam Organization.

Individual Study

Mr Name: Patil Vijay Age: 48 Caste: OBC

Village : Nandur k

Background: Mr. Vijay Patil is

from Nandur k village in Kalaburagi district. His wife works as a homemaker, while he works in the fields. They have Two children, and their family's income was just about sufficient. However, he mentioned difficulties in affording the children's education and repaying debts taken from fellow villagers.

Result: The workers of the Ujjeevana scheme by Seva Sangama visited Nandur k village and met Mr. Vijay Patil in his field. They learned about the various hardships his family was facing. Mr. Vijay Patil was growing vegetables on an acre of land. However, due to pests, the crops were getting heavily damaged, and he expressed his frustration. Community educator informed him that the use of chemical pesticides and fertilizers was reducing the fertility of the soil and stunting the crops. He was advised to stop using chemical fertilizers and to switch to organic fertilizers. Additionally, he was told to maintain cleanliness in his one-acre field, grow vegetables, and take advantage of the facilities provided by the horticulture and agriculture departments.

Change: Under the Ujjeevana scheme by Seva Sangama, Mr. Vijay Patil reduced the use of chemical pesticides and fertilizers. He maintained cleanliness in his one-acre field and grew vegetables using organic fertilizers. To protect the vegetable garden, he received insecticides and pipes from the agriculture department. This enabled him to safeguard his garden and use the vegetables for household consumption instead of taking them to the market and also selling additional to the market Rs. 4000 weekly and Rs. 16,000 monthly. He mentioned that vegetables fetch higher prices in the market, which greatly helped in affording his children's education and repaying debts.

SPARSHA ANTICANCER CAMPAIGN- INSTILLING HOPE

(Awareness, detection treatment and prevention of cancer in Karnataka)



With the financial support of caritas India, Sevasangama is implementing the programme as third phase in kalburgi taluk; The main objectives of the third phase are to identify new volunteers, to strengthen

the existing volunteers and to train them to carry out the task of spreading the cancer awareness in every village of the diocese.

Goal: A society that mitigates the threat of deadly disease cancer through awareness, early detection, and treatment and prevents it by adopting a healthy lifestyle in Kalaburagi and Bidar districts.

OBJECTIVES:

To make people aware of cancer and adopt healthy lifestyle

To establish systematic approaches/ strategies to diagnose treat and prevent cancer

To Create a Sustainable approach to be in place for the further cause

Activities:

Awareness Programs:

A total of 341 awareness programs were conducted for school children, women's groups, men's/farmers' groups, Gram Panchayat members, village leaders, SHG members, Anganwadi teachers, ASHA workers, pregnant women, and lactating mothers. In total, 9,189 participants attended, with 8,500 members gaining substantial knowledge about the impact of cancer. They are now well-informed about the types and causes of



cancer, as well as preventive measures they can incorporate into their daily lives. Additionally, they were encouraged to establish kitchen gardens, learning about their benefits. As a result, many participants have started growing organic vegetables and millets, incorporating organic food into their diets. This has contributed to improved health and enhanced livelihoods...

Health campaign programs:

Nine health check-up camps were conducted, with 617 people participating in the screening program. One cancer patient was identified, and general medical check-ups were conducted for three patients. All patients received free medication.





Donation coupons were sold as part of a local fundraising activity
across various villages in the Gulbarga Diocese, involving people from all categories. This effort
successfully raised a total of ₹1,43,720.

Volunteers Training programs:

Training programs were conducted for 423 volunteers from various groups, including school and college students, YSM leaders, SHG members, Anganwadi teachers, ASHA workers, farmers, and community animators from the Gulbarga Diocese. These sessions focused on spreading awareness about the types of cancer, its negative impacts, causes, and daily preventive measures. Volunteers were also trained on how to identify potential new patients and received comprehensive orientation on these topics.



Cancer day Observation:

World Cancer Day was celebrated in Gulbarga and Humnabad to raise awareness about the types of cancer, its negative impacts, ways to identify new patients, and daily preventive measures. A total of 450 beneficiaries from various groups participated in the event, where they received in-depth orientation on these important topics.



"Cancer Awareness- One Day Workshop"

On April 20, a training session on cancer was organized in collaboration with Orbit and the Indian Cancer Society at the auditorium of Orbit Institute in Humnabad Taluk. Gururaj Kulkarni, District Coordinator of the Indian Cancer Society, served as the resource person for the training, providing valuable information about cancer. He emphasized that, as



cancer is spreading rapidly these days, awareness is crucial for prevention, particularly in rural areas where social workers operate. He also discussed appropriate treatment options for cancer. The training was attended by Orbit's director, Fr. Victor Vas, co-director Fr. Vijay Kumar, program manager Sister William Mathew, as well as staff from Seva Sangama and Orbit

Vidya Vikas Program:

Evening Tuition Centre for Slum Children:

Seva Sangama has implemented this project in five urban slums of Gulbarga. During this reporting period, we established five evening tuition centers, enrolling a total of 137 children from 1st to 10th standard. The conditions of children in these slums are precarious, as their parents are daily wage workers and are unable to provide individual attention to their children's education and personal growth. In response to this critical situation, the project aims to provide holistic support and extra coaching to these vulnerable children. We have also encouraged participation in extracurricular activities such as national and international celebrations, competitions, and sports. Winners are recognized and awarded suitable prizes for their achievements

Activities and Achievements:

The children from the slums are actively encouraged to participate in a variety of extracurricular activities and competitions, which include speech contests, drawing competitions, dance contests, singing competitions, and quiz competitions, along with regular weekly and monthly internal assessments, as well as games and sports. A total of 137 children have taken part in these initiatives.

Among the participants, notable achievements include 10 children receiving prizes for their exceptional academic performance, while 12 children were awarded for their accomplishments in the speech competition. In the drawing competition, 20 children earned prizes for their creativity, and 6 children were recognized in the singing competition. Additionally, 25 children were honored for their performances in dance competitions, and 5 groups received awards for their overall best performance.

These activities not only enhance the children's skills and talents but also foster a sense of community and achievement, contributing to their overall personal development and confidence. The impact of such programs in slum areas cannot be overstated, as they provide vital opportunities for growth and recognition that these children may not otherwise receive.

Birthday Celebrations: Children's birthdays were celebrated at all centers with cake-cutting ceremonies and prayers for God's blessings.

At five tuition centers, Republic Day was celebrated. Eight children participated in the International Women's Day celebration, performing a dance at Kannada Bhavan in Kalaburgi. A total of 137 children from all six tuition centers celebrated Christmas with cultural programs. Additionally, five children from slum areas enjoyed a one-day learning trip to significant sites in Basavakalyana, the birthplace of the great social reformer Lord Basaveshvara. The trip included visits to Anubhava Mantapa, Bijjala's fort, the 108-foot-tall Basavanna statue, and the surrounding garden. During the trip, children learned about Basavanna's life history through illustrated portraits. Seventy-six children and teachers participated in this excursion.

Furthermore, 170 children and their parents attended the Children's Day celebration at St. Mary's School in Kalaburgi. Two hundred parents participated in a parent-teacher meeting, where they received information about child rights and tips for promoting a healthy lifestyle for children. One hundred fifty children were provided with notebooks and other stationery items. All the tuition center children celebrated the New Year 2024 together. On Constitution Day, 137 children participated in the celebration and were motivated to understand the significance of this day. Dr. B. R. Ambedkar's death anniversary was also commemorated, with 50 children participating and receiving guidance on reading and reflecting on books about Ambedkar's life.









WOMEN EMPOWERMENT PROGRAM

The program covers 655 women belonging to 42 Self Help Groups (SHGs) in 15 Grama Panchayats in Gulbarga taluks of Gulbarga district. The target groups of the program include rural women and adolescent girls.

WEP- WOMEN IN MICRO ENTERPRISE:SAMRUDHI

Women empowerment is the primary focus of Sevasangam. Currently, the women empowerment program has been merged with the Jana Jagruthi Munch program. However, the existing Self-Help Groups (SHGs) are regularly visited, and their records are checked and updated by the appointed animator. At present, there are 79 SHGs under Seva Sangama across four talukas: Kalaburgi, Sedam, Wadi, and Aland. Training programs and awareness sessions related to SHGs are conducted for women in these areas

Goal: Empower leaders of marginalized communities; Farmers' Leaders, leaders among adolescent girls, child leaders, women leaders among SHGs & youth leaders to achieve integrated community development through collaborative social actions in availing Govt. entitlements, promoting nutrition, health & hygiene, and ecology in 15 villages and 6 panchayats in Sedam taluk of Kalaburagi District.

Objectives:

- Train and empower leaders of marginalized communities to help and assist communities to avail jobs under the MGNREGA scheme along with other entitlements in 15 villages and 6 panchayats in Sedam taluk of Kalaburagi District through collaborative social actions.
- Adolescent girls, lactating mothers, and pregnant women to know about sexual and reproductive health, and hygiene to practice the same thus community should be aware of health issues and make efforts to access health facilities.




Impression: She has become a role model for other women in the the village who come from poor economic backgrounds. Samrudhi has become a beacon of hope in their lives.
